

The locals call Tacoma the "City of Destiny." They received no argument from the Duke soccer team in 1986.

The Blue Devils brought home the school's first NCAA team championship, clinching the soccer title with a 1-0 victory over Akron on Dec. 13.

On four previous occasions, athletic teams at Duke had played for national championships and lost, including one in soccer four years prior.

The 1986 triumph erased some of the sting from Duke's 2-1, eight-overtime defeat by Indiana in the 1982 title match and fulfilled a four-year dream of that year's class of 11 seniors to return to the championship game and bring the trophy home.

"Unfinished business" was the way coach John Rennie referred to Duke's title match. "This feels just unbelievable," he added.

Blue Devils Tom Stone and Kelly Weadock claimed the offensive and defensive most valuable player awards in the game. Stone, a junior forward, scored the lone goal at 46:38, and senior sweeper Weadock, starting all 87 games in his Duke career, anchored the Blue Devils' defense to its 12th shutout of the season.

Rennie found it hard to single out players for commendation, however. "If Duke University were to give a degree to this team, then it would be for chemistry," he said. "Our guys had their own magic formula for the last six weeks. Chemistry is what all great teams have."



Although the game was played on the artificial indoor surface of the Tacoma Dome, Duke, 18-5-1, stuck with virtually the same game plan that had carried them to the championship game: attack early and get the ball out of their end guickly.

The guick-striking Blue Devils took only 1:38 of the second half to put the game's only goal on the scoreboard. Robert Probst was fouled near midfield by Akron forward Roderick Scott.

Freshman midfielder Joe Valenti took the long free kick for Duke. He crossed the ball over the head of Akron sweeper Matt Smith to the far post for Carl Williamson, who knocked it back to the near post for Stone.

"It came right to my left leg and I swung away," said Stone, who drilled it high into the open net from seven yards out for his 16th goal of the year, just one off the school record. Half of those goals were game-winners, and Stone credited Rennie for making him a more effective offensive player that year.

"All Coach Rennie has said," 'Get up in the box, your chances will come, I promise," Stone said. Four of his goals came in the NCAA playoffs, more than

Both teams concentrated their defenses to stop the opposition's top scorer. Duke used Probst, a freshman stopper, to mark Scott, a sophomore forward who was also a member of the Canadian National Team.

Akron fullback Shaun Docking was assigned to Duke's John Kerr, who, following the championship, was named the recipient of the 1986 Hermann Trophy, given to the nation's top player, and the National Player of the Year Award of the Missouri Athletic Club.

Kerr, who led the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring with 44 points, took only three of Duke's 11 shots in the national title game. Most of the night Kerr was being hammered by Akron enforcer Grahame Evison, who committed 11 fouls. Kerr expected as much.

"Any time you get a game like this, it will be physical," he said. "You're playing for all the marbles. They were told to go out and hit people, make every tackle 100

The Zips' Scott was held to two harmless first half shots by Probst, who earned Rennie's praise. "He's done that all year," the coach said. "He was able to shut down Scott for almost a full game. We always assign him to the opposition's most important player. Most of the damage Scott did was out away from the goal. We forced him to lay the ball out to other players, while he couldn't perform his

Added Rennie, "You win with defense. It's like that in any sport."

Call it destiny if you like. The Duke soccer team could then wave their extended index fingers and chant, "We're number one," and know it was true.

ACC Championships



1980 Regular Season Champions

In John Rennie's second year at the helm of the Duke soccer program, he led the Blue Devils to their first ACC Championship. Duke achieved their highest ever ranking of 11th and finished the season with a 15-4-3 record. They went undefeated in conference games with a mark of 4-0-2 to take the championship. Sean McCoy led the way with nine goals and six assists. Boris Ilicic recorded 109 saves and only allowed 18 goals in 22 contests with nine shutouts.



1982 Regular Season Champions

Joe Ulrich became the first of six Duke players to earn National Player of the Year honors when he led the Blue Devils to the school's first national championship appearance. Duke set a school record with a 24-game unbeaten streak before losing to Indiana in the National Championship game, 2-1 in eight overtimes. The Blue Devils ended with a 22-1-2 record and were 4-0-2 in the ACC. Tom Kain had an outstanding freshman season with 13 goals and 20 assists for 46 points while Bob Jenkins tallied 16 goals. Pat Johnston recorded 12 shutouts, allowing just 18 goals and stopping 124 shots.





1999 Regular Season and ACC Tournament Champions

The Blue Devils earned their first ACC Tournament Championship in 1999. Duke went through the season undefeated before losing to Santa Clara in the NCAA Tournament. The team finished 16-1-3 and 4-0-2 in the ACC. The Blue Devils began the ACC Tournament against arch-rival North Carolina and after a scoreless first half, Troy Garner scored twice within a three-minute span to break the game open. Twenty minutes later, Donald McIntosh connected on two goals in a three-minute span to seal the 4-0 victory. The Blue Devils squared off against seven-time tournament champion Virginia in the finals. Ali Curtis gave Duke a 1-0 lead with a goal eight minutes into the game. The Cavaliers came back to tie the score just after halftime in the 47th minute. The match went scoreless for the next 81 minutes before Stephen Pate found the back of the net in the third overtime to give the Blue Devils the title.



2005 ACC Tournament Champions

The 2005 ACC Tournament was filled with excitement for the Blue Devils. The fifth-seed in the tournament, Duke started with a 2-0 victory over 10th-ranked Virginia Tech. Chase Perfect came into the contest having only played 30 minutes on the season, but gave the Blue Devils a 1-0 lead with his first goal of the season off a corner kick. Zach Pope later tallied an empty net goal. Duke faced No. 1 Maryland in the semifinals and came out strong at the start. Blake Camp scored two goals in the first 15 minutes and Pope made it 3-0 with a goal three minutes into the second half. Maryland stormed back in the final 10 minutes with two goals but Spencer Wadsworth put the finishing touches on the Blue Devil's 4-2 victory. Duke faced No. 4 North Carolina in the finals and for the second time in the season the two played through two overtimes with a scoreless tie. The championship came down to penalty kicks. The Blue Devils trailed 4-3 and faced a loss but Justin Papadakis made a key save and Camp evened the shootout at 4-4. In the extra round of kicks, Papadakis made another save and freshman Mike Grella converted his kick to give the Blue Devils the 5-4 shootout victory.

The Duke men's soccer program has established a reputation as one of the top program's in the country since Head Coach John Rennie started his tenure in 1979. The Blue Devils have been to five NCAA College Cups and won the national championship in 1986 with a 1-0 victory over Akron. Rennie has

produced 15 All-Americas in his 27 years at the helm and has had several of his former players move on to play professional

One of the biggest names in Major League Soccer history is a former Blue Devil. Real Salt Lake forward, Jason Kreis, became the league's all-time leading scorer in 2004 and last season became the first player in MLS history to score 100 career goals. He broke the scoring record with a goal in the 37th minute against D.C. United on June 26, 2004. His 100th goal came on August 13, 2005 against Kansas City. Kreis was the 43rd overall pick (fifth round) in the Inaugural MLS Draft in 1996. He was drafted by the Dallas Burn and scored the franchise's first-ever goal on April 18, 1996, against Kansas City. He played his first nine seasons with Dallas before he was traded to Real Salt Lake for future considerations on Nov. 17, 2004.

Kreis has 106 career goals and 74 assists. He has been

named to the all-star team seven times and was given the Honda MVP award in 1999 as the player of the year. He captured the scoring title that season, becoming the first player in MLS history to score 15 goals and have 15 assists in the same season. Kreis was a three-time All-America selection at Duke and ranks among the top 10 in career goals and the top five in assists and points.

Three other Duke players were selected in the Inaugural MLS Draft with two of them also going to Dallas. Mark Dodd, a former goalkeeper, was drafted in the sixth round (53rd overall pick) by the Burn. He spent four years in the league and was named the Goalkeeper of the Year in 1996 after posting a 1.46 goals against average. Before the creation of the MLS, Dodd played for the Dallas Sidekicks in the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) and the Colorado Foxes of the American Professional Soccer League (APSL). He earned 15 caps for the United States national team.

Midfielder John Kerr was also picked up by Dallas as the 83rd overall pick (ninth round). Kerr played 12 games for the Burn in 1996 before finishing out the season with New England. He went on to play one more year with the Revolution, tallying seven goals and six assists for his career. After his career with the MLS he played two seasons with the Boston Bulldogs of the professional A-league as a playercoach. In college Kerr helped lead Duke to their first NCAA Championship and was awarded both the Hermann Trophy and the first-ever Missouri Athletic Club Award as the nation's top player. He was a two-time All-America and three-time All-Region selection at Duke. He ranks in the top five goals, assists and points. After college he played professional soccer in England, Ireland, France, Canada and the U.S. He also played with the U.S. National team from 1984-1995. He is currently the Head Men's Soccer coach at Harvard.

The fourth Blue Devil selected in 1996 was goalkeeper Garth Lagerway. He was chosen in the 15th round (150th overall pick) by D.C. United but played 23 games for Kansas City and posted a 1.75 goals against average. In the 1997 and '98 seasons he played for Dallas, and from 1999-2000 he played for Miami. While at Duke, he was an All-Region selection in 1992. He also has recorded the most saves by any Blue Devil in both ACC and NCAA tournament play with 12 saves against Virginia on Nov. 5, 1993, and 12 saves against Southern Methodist on Nov. 27, 1992.

In 1997, Brian Kelly

became the first Duke player to be selected in the first round of the MLS College Draft. The forward was chosen by the MetroStars with the fifth overall pick. Kelly played three full seasons with the MetroStars before he was traded to Los Angeles midway through the 2000 campaign. He spent his final season with Tampa Bay in 2001 and finished his career with 10 goals and 11 assists. In his collegiate playing days, Kelly was a third team All-America selection in 1995 and two-time All-Region choice. He is eighth all-time at Duke with 29 assists.

Two Blue Devils were drafted in the 1999 MLS College Draft. Jay Heaps, the 1998 Missouri

Athletic Club award winner, became the highest Duke player drafted, going second overall to

the Miami Fusion. Miami traded up from the fifth pick to take the two-time All-America. In his rookie season with the club, he was named MLS Rookie of the Year after scoring three goals. He spent three seasons with Miami and recorded a career-high five goals and six assists in 2000 to earn his first all-star selection in 2000. Midway through the 2001 season he was traded to New England and remains a starter for the Revolution defense. A year later he scored the game-winning goal in the semifnal game against Columbus to lead the Revolution into the MLS Cup. Heaps ranks in the top five in career goals, assists and points at Duke. He was named to the All-South Region team

all four years of college and was both the National and ACC Freshman of the Year in 1995. Heaps was the embodiment of Duke Athletics, playing both soccer and basketball. Not only did he possess great athletic talent but he was also a great student and was one of three Duke soccer players to be named Academic

All-America.

Defender Evan Whitfield was also taken in the first round, when Chicago picked him with the 11th overall selection. He joined the Fire midway through the 1999 season after a stint of playing professional soccer for KAA Gent in Belgium. He played five seasons with the Fire, helping them to three division championships and two Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup Championships. He started the 2005 season as a member of Real Salt Lake where he finished his career. Whitfield was a three-time All-Region selection for the Blue Devils and four-time All-ACC pick.

Duke had another player drafted with the second overall pick in 2001. Ali Curtis, a two-time player of the year recipient

at Duke, was chosen by the Tampa Bay Mutiny. Curtis was named the ACC Player of the Year and was awarded the Hermann Trophy in his junior year. As a senior, he became the all-time leading scorer at Duke with 53 goals, and was given the Missouri Athletic Club Award. Curtis was a two-time All-America and four time All-Region selection. He played three years of Major League Soccer. He played his first season with Tampa Bay and then moved on to D.C. United where he had his best season in 2002 with five goals and one assist. He started

the 2003 season with D.C. United before he was traded to Dallas where he finished his career. In his rookie season with Tampa Bay, he was honored with the Mutiny's 2001 New York Life Humanitarian of the Year award and was a finalist for the 2001 MLS New York Life Humanitarian of the Year award.

Also drafted in 2001 was **Robert Russell**, a former All-America at Duke. Russell was drafted by Los Angeles in the second round with the 22nd overall pick. He instead decided to sign with Sogndal in the Premiere League in Norway. He was later acquired by Rosenborg of the Norway Premiere League and led them to a Premier League Championship to earn the right to play in the UEFA Champions League in 2004 against Arsenal and PSV Eindhoven. In the summer of 2006, he signed with Viborg FF of Denmark's top-flight Superligaen. At Duke he was a four-time All-ACC selection and was named to the All-South region team in 2000.

There have been two other Duke players drafted by MLS teams. Josh
Henderson was taken in the fourth round of the 2000

SuperDraft by Los Angeles and Kevin Sakuda was picked up in the third round of the 2002 SuperDraft with the 39th overall pick by San Jose. Henderson was a two-time All-ACC selection and ranks in the top ten in career assists at Duke. Sakuda played for the San Diego Sockers and Cleveland Storm of the MISL and is now in his fourth season with the Seattle Sounders of the United Soccer League First Division. In

college he was an All-Region choice in 1999 and helped lead the Blue Devils to their first-ever ACC Tournament Championship.

Four former Duke players are currently on MLS rosters. Heaps is still with New England, while Kreis is playing for Real Salt Lake. **Jordan Cila**, who was

a four-year letterwinner for the Blue Devils from 2000-03, is currently playing for the New York Red Bulls along with Blake Camp. Cila was a two-time All-ACC selection and is fifth on the career assists list at Duke. He spent his first season in the MLS with Colorado in 2004 where he helped them into the playoffs. In 21 games he scored four goals and had two assists. Last season he played for Real Salt Lake, scoring three goals and adding an assist in 12 contests. Camp, a two-time All-America choice at Duke, was drafted in the fourth round with the 41st pick of the 2006 MLS Draft. Camp led the Blue


Other former Duke players who have been affiliated with the MLS are Doug Hamilton, Mike Jeffries, Mark Noonan and Trevor Perea. Hamilton

for the Dallas Burn in 2001 and 2002. He
guided the team to the playoffs in his first
season with the club. Noonan was the Vice

season with the club. Noonan was the Vice President of Marketing for the MLS. Perea played one season in the league. He signed a contract in 2003 with the Columbus Crew and finished the year with D.C. United.

Before the creation of the MLS, **Tom Kain** played professional soccer in West Germany and for the Kansas City Comets of the MISL. He moved on to later become the Global Futbol Marketing Director for Nike. Kain became the third Duke player to be awarded the Hermann Trophy as the National Player of the Year in 1985. He was also the first four-time All-America for the Blue Devils. Kain played for the US National Team and was one of two Duke players to play in the Olympics. He was the first soccer player to be elected into the Duke Hall

of Fame. He is the all-time leader in points and assists and is second in career goals.








- ♦ Robert Russell became the latest Blue Devil to train with the U.S. Men's National Team this year. Others who have been invited to play with the full team include Jason Kreis, Mark Dodd, Jay Heaps, Evan Whitfield, John Kerr and Brian Benedict.
- ♦ 2004 Duke graduate Jordan Cila played on the US Under-17 National Team that was a semifinalist at the Under-17 World Championships in New Zealand. Cila ranked second on the team with 46 goals and 38 assists. Cila also was a member of the US Under-20 National Team.
- ♦ Brian Kelly competed with the Under-23 National Team prior to the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney.

Duke in the Community

The Duke men's soccer team participates actively in the Durham community. Each year, men's soccer players visit elementary schools throughout the area as part of the Verizon Read with the Blue Devils program. For the 15th year, Duke Athletics and the Durham Public School System have combined their efforts to aid area teachers in providing reading incentives for third and fourth graders. More than 4,000 students in Durham County are involved in the program annually.



From the inception of the Read with the Blue Devils program, school visits by Duke student-athletes have been a major component. Almost 200 Duke student-athletes from nearly all 26 varsity sports, including numerous Blue Devil soccer players, make periodic visits to the third and fourth grade classes, working with the youngsters on reading and goal-setting. Duke Athletics provides positive role models for both boys and girls at the elementary schools.





The Blue Devils also spend time after each game signing autographs. Fans can meet the players on the field shortly

following the end of each game. The Duke Soccer Camp offers day and overnight camps throughout the year for beginners and advanced players,



including the top 100 Seniors Program for rising high school seniors. Over 1,000 kids attended the camps this summer. More information

National Players of the Year

During John Rennie's 27-year tenure as the head soccer coach at Duke University, National Player of the Year awards have become as much a part of the tradition at the school as the success of the team on the field.

The Hermann Trophy, one of the most coveted individual awards in collegiate soccer, has been presented since 1967. Duke, fortunate to have five Hermann recipients, is one of the rare schools to produce back-to-back winners.

The Hermann is named for Robert Hermann, former chairman of the executive committee of the NASL, one of its founding owners and a true pioneer in American soccer. The Missouri Athletic Club Award was developed in 1986 in an effort to recognize the top American collegiate soccer player.



Joe Ulrich, 1982
-The 1982 Hermann recipient,
Ulrich was Duke's
first national player

A native of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., Ulrich was a first-round selection in four pro soccer drafts and enjoyed a pro career with the Dallas Sidekicks of the MISL. He was inducted into the Duke Hall of Fame in 1998.





Mike Jeffries, 1983 - The 1983 Hermann winner at sweeper, Jeffries was one of Duke's most durable players, performing in all 89 career matches. The Bethesda, Md., native led

Duke to a No. 1 national ranking during his entire senior season. A versatile performer who played forward, midfield and defense during his career, Jeffries was the first American chosen in the 1983 MISL draft as he joined the Minnesota Strikers organization.



Tom Kain, 1985 - Duke's first fourtime All-America honoree in any sport, Kain earned the Hermann Trophy in 1985. A striker from Wall, N.J., Kain was one of the most prolific scorers in Duke history, holding

school records for assists (45) and total points (147), while ranking second in goals (51). He led the Blue Devils to a combined record of 68-13-7 and three NCAA Tournament berths during his four seasons and also made the Olympic Team. The runner-up for the 1984 Hermann Trophy, Kain was the first soccer player at Duke to be selected to the Duke Hall of Fame. Kain played professionally in West Germany and in the MISL.



John Kerr, 1986
- Kerr reached three milestones in 1986. In addition to winning the Hermann Trophy and the inaugural Missouri Athletic Club Award, Kerr also led Duke to the NCAA title, the

Blue Devils' first team title in any sport. Kerr was the squad's leading scorer with 15 goals and 14 assists and also topped the ACC in scoring while claiming the ACC Player of the Year award. A native of Falls Church, Va., Kerr finished his career as Duke's No. 2 all-time scorer. Kerr played for New England and Dallas in the MLS and Millwall in England and has been a past player with the U.S. National Team. He is currently the head men's soccer coach at Harvard.

collected a team-high 13 goals and eight assists for 34 points in 1998. He completed his career ranked third in goals (45), fourth in assists (37) and tied for second in points (127) at Duke. The native of Longmeadow, Mass., was also a member of the Duke basketball team as a walk-on during his stint in Durham. The Academic All-America honoree graduated a semester early to pursue his professional soccer career. Heaps was the No. 2 pick overall in the MLS Draft by Miami in 1999 and came out in his first year to claim MLS Rookie of the Year accolades. He is currently one of the top young players in the MLS with the New England Revolution.



Ali Curtis, 2000

- Curtis was a three-timeAll-ACC and All-America selection. He was named the ACC Player of the Year and winner of the Hermann Trophy after scoring 17 goals and notching

40 points as a junior. His senior year he won the Missouri Athletic Club Award after scoring 15 goals and adding nine assists for 39 points. He left Duke as the career scoring leader with 53 goals, and his 134 points rank second all time. In his final two years at Duke, Curtis scored 32 goals, assisted on 15 goals and totaled 79 points. He was the second overall pick in the 2001 MLS draft by the Tampa Bay Mutiny.
